

In this time of quiet, may we look within, and offer God the wholeness and truth of our lives as we confess our sin to our forgiving God.

Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed.
We have not loved you with our whole heart.
We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. In your mercy

forgive what we have been, help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be: that we may do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with you, our God. Amen.

Priest: Almighty God,

who forgives all who truly repent,

have mercy upon you,

pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness,

and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

Priest: Glory to God in the highest,

All: and peace to God's people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly king, almighty God and Father,

we worship you, we give you thanks,

we praise you for your glory.

An Affirmation of Faith (Based on "A Liturgical Affirmation", from A New Zealand Prayer Book)

Leader: We declare our faith as we say:

All: You, O God, are supreme and holy.
You create our world and give us life.
Your purpose overarches everything we do.
You have always been with us.
You are God.

You, O God, are infinitely generous, good beyond all measure.
You came to us before we came to you.
You have revealed and proved your love for us in Jesus Christ, who lived and died and rose again.
You are with us now.
You are God.

You, O God, are Holy Spirit. You empower us to be your gospel in the world. You reconcile and heal; you overcome death.

You are our God. We worship you. Amen.

Prayers of Thanksgiving and Intercession Sitting, standing or kneeling, as is your custom.

In response to the words, "Blessed are you, O God," the community prays, "for all your goodness to us.".

Let us pray with confidence as God's holy people for the needs of the Church, all families, and for our world...

Blessed are you, O God, for all your goodness to us. In Christ, we meet your love and wisdom, face to face.

Through the Holy Spirit, we recognize the abilities and opportunities you create in us and for us to reach out to the world you love. We thank you for all the ways friends and families, neighbours and strangers, reach out to us and to others, offering support and kindness, speaking up to confront wrongdoing, celebrating when achievements bring happiness and healing.

Silence is held.

All: Blessed are you, O God, for all your goodness to us.

Today we pray for courageous leaders in cities, countries and congregations who strive to serve with integrity and honesty in a world prone to self-interest.

We pray for those who struggle to create justice where it has been compromised, and to build understanding in divided communities. We remember before you quiet and reliable leaders who keep their word and meet their deadlines so that we can depend on them in these unsettled times.

Silence is held.

AII:

Blessed are you, O God, for all your goodness to us.

We pray for patient church members and community volunteers, who work diligently to improve our life together. And we pray for the creative, impatient change makers who keep challenging us to be bolder and more determined in righting wrongs and trying new strategies.

We pray for those who are troubled in mind or spirit, for those who feel angry and unhappy, and for those who feel that every day is a struggle. Soothe their concerns and open their hearts to claim the hope and help you offer.

Silence is held.

Blessed are you, O God,

All: for all your goodness to us.

We remember before you those who are sick, those who are dying, and those who are bereaved who must try to put their lives back together again. We pray for those who are looking for better health, a fresh start, more stability or a glimpse of hope. Draw close to all these who suffer, offering your comfort and courage to face whatever comes next.

Silence is held.

Blessed are you, O God,

All: for all your goodness to us.

Receive our prayers, both spoken and unspoken, and embrace us all in your love. Give us hearts to understand not only what you do on our behalf, but also what you call us to do on your behalf, for we are friends and followers of Jesus, in whose name we pray.

All: Amen.

Priest: The Lord be with you.

Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Priest: Father, almighty and everliving God,

at all times and in all places

it is right to give you thanks and praise:

And so with all your people, with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and singing:

(From Common Praise # 735):

All: Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might.
Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full,
full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest,
hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes

Congregation may sit or kneel at this time.

Priest: Blessed are you, Father,
the creator and sustainer of all things;
you made us in your own image,
male and female you created us;
even when we turned away from you,
you never ceased to care for us,
but in your love and mercy
you freed us from the slavery of sin,
giving your only begotten Son to become man
and suffer death on the cross to redeem us.

He made there the one complete and all-sufficient sacrifice for the sins of the whole world: he instituted, and in his holy Gospel commanded us to continue, a perpetual memory of his precious death until he comes again.

On the night that he was betrayed he took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup; and when he had given thanks to you, he gave it to them, saying, Drink this, all of you, for this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Therefore, Father, with this bread and this cup we do as Christ your Son commanded:

All: we remember his passion and death, we celebrate his resurrection and ascension, and we look for the coming of his kingdom.

Priest: Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; and as we eat and drink these holy gifts, grant by the power of the life-giving Spirit that we may be made one in your holy Church and partakers of the body and blood of your Son, that he may dwell in us and we in him.

Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord, by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, Almighty Father, for ever and ever.

All: Amen. (Sung 5 times - From Common Praise # 737)

The Lord's Prayer (Please stand as you are able.)

Priest: In the words that our Saviour taught us, we pray:

All: Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.

Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial. and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power. and the glory are yours. now and for ever. Amen.

Breaking of the Bread (From Common Praise # 747) Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us. AII: Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer, redeemer of the world, give us your peace, give us your peace.

The Giving of Communion

The table of bread and wine is now ready. Priest: It is the table of company with Jesus, and all who love him. It is the table of sharing with the poor of the world. with whom Jesus identified himself. It is the table of communion with the earth. in which Christ became incarnate. So come to this table. you who have much faith and you who would like to have more; you who have been here often and you who have not been for a while; you who have tried to follow Jesus, and you who have failed; Come. It is Christ who invites us to meet him here.

Please follow the directions of the sidespeople as the congregation is invited to come forward to receive the bread and wine.

If you would prefer not to receive communion, please come forward for a blessing. Crossing your hands over your chest will signal the priest to give you a blessing instead.
