Invitation to Confession

Priest: Today's readings focus on reconciliation,

but reconciliation requires two people

God offers us both forgiveness and reconciliation,

and does not hold our sins against us

as we ask for forgiveness.

Are we able to do the same with one another?

As we prepare to enter into today's eucharist, let us search our hearts and confess our failings and challenges to our God who receives us, arms wide open, first in silence.
